The REAL Program

As most are aware, we have moved our REAL Program location from the Lions Club on Boyne St. to a much larger location at 169 Dufferin Street South. The space will afford us the opportunity to address the current over crowding, to provide separate space for youth who need it and to expand not only our numbers but also the methods in which we choose to educate the youth in the program.

Jen's Place will gradually be moving the administrative office out of the residence and over to the new location as well. We have always discussed this as an eventual option but when the OACYC Chronicle came out in Dec. with an article that discussed the presence of a staff office in a residence we decided to make some changes. The article states ' we have come to unconditionally accept the need for a staff office in the group home, and yet this is by far the most institutional feature of the place... staff offices contradict the very essence of child and youth work, and their presence undermines the very ethos of the profession" (K. Gharabagaghi). Although we acknowledge the requirement to have a separate locked space for files etc, the locked office space will be more of a Resource Room for the staff.

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<u>CYW Views</u>

In the field of Child and Youth Work, there is always the emphasis on 'life skills'. Recently, we began looking at it differently and saw that there are at least two groups of life skills that need separate attention. You see, with *Life Skills*, there is the element of being able to have the knowledge and skill of being able to physically and emotionally function in areas such as independence, personal safety, decision-making & social skills. However, there is also a domain identified as '*Character Building*' that so many of our kids have challenges with, as it is an area that is definitely taught, usually without much formality, early in life. It is character that endears us upon others and that facilitates relationships now and in the future.

Character is defined as 'the mental and moral qualities distinctive to an individual; the strength and originality in a person's nature'. As Cyw's, this teaching is typically done through the way we talk, the behaviours that we model, the behaviours that we tolerate and the actions we reward and reinforce. We need to ensure that our youth not only develop and enhance their moral principles and ethics; we may even need to transform and recreate moral philosophies. Our youth need to be able to judge, care about and believe what is right, and to be able to do it regardless of the external pressures. (www.goodcharacter.com)

Character building should be a teaching requirement, separate from life skills. It is an area in which we should focus on, formally and intensely. Some ideas for character building topics can include:

- Trustworthiness
- Citizenship
- Respect/Self-Respect
- Honesty
- Tact
- Responsibility
- Courage
- Fairness/Justice
- Diligence
- Caring
- Integrity
- Doing the Right Thing
- Dealing with Pressures
- Values
- Friendship
