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Message from the Directors

Jenn and I had the opportunity to be involved in a number of meetings this month that has demonstrated that there are some positive changes in Residential Care coming along. It appears that we are at a crossroad in this field and that the values that Jen's Place has embraced are flourishing within this field. People are demanding change. Academia, the Ministry, CYC, and residential specific organizations are rising to the challenge. Residential programs themselves must look to change or to collapse.

This month, we have participated in a visioning workshop where stakeholders were able to discuss how to create an effective residential care system. We have also participated in a working group to establish a consistent system for identifying the characteristics of a residential program, and a standard financial formula for each child in group and foster care. This month we met an international foster care organization that has demonstrated a commitment to foster children through an effective foster care program that has been so successful, it is currently expanding to five other countries as well as Newfoundland and Ontario.

These changes are all promising because ultimately they lead to the better operation of programs for kids in care and the finally deserve it!

CYW Views

If you ever want to find an opportunity to figure out how 'uncool' you are as an adult, talk to a youth about graffiti. I recently had the opportunity to talk to a 'tagger' (an individual who writes a signature with marker, spraypaint, scribers, or sandpaper on property rather than doing a piece). What I had discovered was that graffiti really is a culture. It has a very sophisticated history, its own language; it is guides by it own rules. Graffiti has its own set of hero's and icon's and wannabee's. Most of what is produced is meaningful to those who are a part of the culture.

As complex as the graffiti culture may be, most *tags* are random acts of vandalism and in any case are participating in an illegal act. Here are some indicators of whether or not a child/youth is a tagger:

- The child frequently wears a large backpack or baggy pants - packs and loose clothing can be used to hold paint cans and carry graffiti tools
- Clothing may be paint stained/has paint on the tip of their fingers/permanent marker stains on hands
- The child carries tools used or etching glass
- The child has large quantities of magic markers, shoe polish containers, etching tools, spray paint, bug spray, starch cans or other devices for drawing
- The child has these items and no income to afford them
- The child has graffiti magazines, flyers, piece book/portfolio of tags
- The child possesses large quantities of "my name is" stickers or other large stickers used for sticker tagging
- The child's internet browser has bookmarks to graffiti advocate websites
- The child has photographs of graffiti and tags on walls that look familiar to you

A graffiti crew is a group of individuals who work together to create huge pieces and murals to make their crew as famous as they can. Local crews are not well respected by graffiti artists, as the intention is pure vandalism. This is demonstrated by the unorganization, lack of artistic ability and cause. They usually tag with names like FTP (F*** the Police) or SSR (Slippery Sam's Recruiting), etc
